# Help Wanted '98 Counts needs: Candidates, Volunteers, \$\$\$

The Libertarian Party of New York is planning to make the 1998 Gubernatorial campaign its most ambitious yet. If the LP candidate for Governor can poll at least 50,000 votes, LPNY will become an officially recognized party in New York. In addition to allowing voters to register as Libertarians, this will greatly ease petitioning requirements and make it much easier to run candidates for other offices.

LPNY wants to start gearing up for this campaign now by assembling a list of all interested

# Libertarian Candidates Galore

- Turmo-Wilber seeks re-election
- Nassau nominates 8

There are 10 candidates seeking to run for election on the Libertarian line this year in New York State. Though no official records have been kept, this is believed to be the greatest number of Libertarians to ever run for public office in New York. Rebecca Turmo-Wilber, the only Libertarian to hold public office in the state, is seeking re-election position on the Woodstock town council. In Hyde Park, David Harnett is also seeking election to the town council.

In Nassau, there are Libertarians seeking office. Vincent O'Neill is running for County Executive; Daniel Conti for District Attorney; Richard Cooper for County Comptroller; Ira Raab for County Court Judge; Jeffrey Brown for County Court Judge; Al Cooper for County Court Judge; James Harris for County Clerk; and Stephen Edmonson for County Legislator.

All of the candidates except

Edmonson are for countywide office and are listed on the same petition. Fred Newton and John Driscoll are organizing petition drive which must collect 1500 signatures to get the slate on the ballot. The petition drive runs through August 19, and volunteers are still needed to help out. Anyone interested in helping should contact the Nassau County LP at: (516) 292-8340. As of the end of July slightly over 2,000 signatures had been collected. The goal was to get 3,000 to ensure that there would be enough signatures to survive a challenge.

Conti, Richard Cooper and Harris are running only as Libertarians. O'Neill and Edmonson are also running as nominees of the Right-to-Life Party. Raab and Brown are also running as the nominees of the Right-to-Life Party and the Democratic Party. Al Cooper is also running as the nominee of the Democratic Party.

In Woodstock, Turmo-Wilber is seeking her second 4-year term on the Woodstock town council. She requires only 163 signatures

candidates. This means. primarily candidates who are interested running in Governor, but also candidates for the other offices on the statewide slate and also candidates for local election. November 1998 may seem far away, but our chances of success are much better the sooner we get started. So, if you're interested in running for office next year, please let someone on the State Committee know as soon as possible.

Local chapters should also start recruiting pledges of signatures from members to get a rough count of how many volunteers we will have and how many signatures can be expected.

While we can't start the actual collection of the signatures until next July, we can start collecting money for the petition drive right now. In New York, we are not allowed to pay petitioners by the number of signatures they collect, but we can pay petitioners an hourly wage. Signatures usually end up costing between \$.50 and \$1.

This mailing is going out to 1030 Libertarians in New York. If each of you contibutes \$20 to the petition drive, we will have over \$20,000 in the bank before the petition drive even begins. That will be enough to buy 20,000 to 40,000 signatures.

# Operation Politically Homeless Meets Gay Pride by Blay Tarnoff

We got 221 respondents at an OPH booth at the Gay Pride Parade, over half of whom (127) fell into the libertarian quadrant or on the border. We also got 57 liberals, 3 conservatives, 24 centrists, and 10 authoritarians. Nearly half (108) identified themselves as independent voters. Also, 86 Democrats, 23 Republicans, and 4 people insisted they were Libertarians, even though the question we asked most people was, "Do you consider yourself a Republican, Democrat, or neither?"

We collected 81 names from the 127 eligible respondents, for a rate at the parade of about 64%. The rate was about the same as at the Hemp Splash.

From these efforts, I would expect about 3 new members in NY from the Hemp Splash, 5 from the Gay Pride Parade, 8 in total.

# Sabrin Running Hard in NJ

In New Jersey, Dr. Murray Sabrin is continuing his high-profile campaign for Governor. Sabrin is a professor of finance at Ramapo College in Mahwah, New Jersey. He recently authored a book called <u>Tax Free 2000</u>: The Rebirth of American Liberty.

Sabrin received the Libertarian nomination for Governor at the New Jersey convention on March 22. In his acceptance address, he told the delegates, "I'm running for governor because the people of New Jersey need a 'Common Sense Government' in Trenton. Both Democrats Republicans are beholden to numerous special interests. My campaign will represent a broad coalition of hundreds of thousands of citizens who want to reduce the size and scope government."

Sabrin is currently trying to raise \$210,000 in campaign contributions. If he reaches that amount by the end of August, he'll be eligible to be included the televised debates Republican Christie Whitman and Democrat Jim McGreevey. He will also be eligible to receive matching funds. As of mid-July he had raised \$50,000 and had pledges for another \$10,000. Sabrin has been endorsed by radio talk show hosts Jim Gearhart and Dennis Malloy on New Jersey 101.5 FM and by Bob Grant on his nationally syndicated show.
