Libertarian Party Internships Available

Would you like to take a semester off, help the Libertarian Party, learn, and earn? The Libertarian Party frequently offers internships to Libertarian students. It may be possible to earn college credit for an LP internship. (It is up to each intern to make arrangements with their school for the appropriate credit).

National HQ Internships

HQ interns will work with the National Director at LP Headquarters in Washington, DC. They will learn about the workings of a membership-political organization from the inside by assisting with various projects and the routine operation of the HQ office. HQ interns will receive a small stipend and the LP will assist in making housing arrangements in DC.

Campus Organizing Internships

Campus Organizing interns will study advance material before training with an experienced field organizer.

After field training, they will visit dozens of colleges and universities to collect names of prospects, give workshops and outreach seminars, generate campus publicity, and organize new College Libertarian Clubs. Campus Organizing interns will stay with local Libertarian hosts and will receive a small stipend and reimbursement for travel expenses.

Applicants must have a dependable vehicle capable of carrying literature, a campus survey unit, and other materials. APPLICATION DEADLINE FOR FALL-93 SEMESTER CAMPUS ORGANIZING INTERNSHIP IS JUNE 14!

Raising money the No Risk way

There's a phrase too common in my recent experience with the LP: "You've got to spend money to make money." Rather than being some sort of sage advice or fundamental truth, it can be an excuse to go forth and fail with no account-

ability for that failure.

Here in Georgia, a different axiom has been used successfully: "Only undertake activities which are No Risk for the party's treasury." Under this rule, any activity proposed needs to come with financing attached or else be ruled out of court. This has proved successful with several projects.

The Georgia LP's Executive Committee, of which I was then a member, had voted to pursue

a ballot access lawsuit. Fortunately, the National Committee saw merit in it and gave us \$1,500 of the approximately \$2,800 needed. We needed to raise another \$1,300 to pay for the lawsuit.

I volunteered to organize a telethon which could not cost the Georgia LP any money regardless of how badly it might fail. I recruited a member who could volunteer his office phone system, a crew to man the phones, and someone to cover the cost of postage

> which would result from the telethon. The state party was experiencing a No Risk activity since all expenses had been covered in advance. The party could only benefit under this arrangement!

> Another much more dramatic example of using this funding principle came with the 1992 state party convention. The 1992 Georgia Annual Convention made \$2,300+ without requiring the first dime from the party checkbook. Everything was pre-funded in advance. The 1992 convention committee kept a close watch on

costs since they had no access to the party's checkbook for covering any profligate expenditures.

Dear Readers;

As the APC News initiates it's fourth year of production and the second issue with me as it's editor, it behooves us to take a look at it's editorial policy.

First of all, the APC News targets the officers of affiliated state & local Libertarian parties, past & present candidates, past & present elected Libertarians and other Libertarian activists. These people - you - are the engine of our party and of the whole Libertarian movement. To keep your activities fresh and responsive to a changing world, you need fresh information about what other activists do that works. That is the kind of information the APC News tries to deliver.

Throughout it's history, the APC News has had an editorial policy that accentuates the positive. It has sought to inform it's readers about what has worked

for others in the most positive light possible. It has been our policy to edit articles that contain negative comments directed at individuals or groups within the party and the movement. And I fully support this policy because to do otherwise would be to discourage these individuals from active service. Even if they are guilty of discouraging others, this is not the proper forum for their censure.

However, it has also been our policy to edit out information about things that **don't** work. This is a part of our policy that I question. Perhaps you can help me. Is it desirable to include this possibly useful information? Or, would it be too difficult to keep personalities out of it's presentation?

Your comments are welcome! Keep in mind that space is limited when you write. Shorter comments are more likely to be printed.

First, the committee members (Dan Walker, Dawn Webber and Allan Wallace) generated cash by paying their individual registration fees months in advance of the actual convention and by asking others to do likewise. This provided their initial working capital. Secondly, appeals were made at the monthly dinner

meetings to those so inclined to contribute toward the expenses of the convention. Also, merchandise (t-shirts and stadium cups) was acquired for sale prior to and during the convention. Two separate contributors volunteered to cover the costs of production, making the sale of those items a pure profit for the party.

Other members were recruited to produce first-quality name tags and other needed items. Of course it was important to recruit volunteers who had already shown an ability to get the job done and who had a healthy regard for the value of money. With this approach the Georgia LP literally could not have lost money on its annual convention.

This convention was held at a very nice hotel, with imported big-name speakers, a full banquet and it at-

tracted media attention. Those attending (who knew nothing of the financial facts) universally praised the day's activities.

Most recently, the Coverdale campaign paid for all tabloid production and distribution costs for the postelection issue of The Georgia Libertarian, while the

LP reaped "several thousand dollars in advertising revenue." *

Worthy activities should always be able to find voluntary backers. This helps sort out the worthy activities from those that would be an unworthy waste of our strapped membership's limited funds. There are many activities that people can and do propose, assuming party funding. But, few proposals ultimately have enough membership

support to include voluntary financing.

Party leaders have an obligation to put forth the effort needed to succeed in a way that is not a drain on the unsecured contributions of unspecified future members. They have a responsibility to be accountable for their expenditures and should not expect others to step forward to clean up after them. No Risk fundraising increases both accountability and success. I hope you'll give it a try.

Jim Cox is a professor of economics who joined the National and Georgia parties in 1973 while in college. He petitioned nationwide in 1976 and 1980, comanaged the Georgia ballot drive for Clark in 1980, edited The Georgia Libertarian for several years and served on the Georgia LP executive committee at various times as Secretary, Treasurer, and At-Large.

* Editor's Note: Last year, Georgia state party
Chair, Jim Hutson ran against incumbent Democrat,
Wiche Fowler and Republican, Paul Coverdale for
senator from Georgia. The election ended with Hutson getting 3% of the vote and the other two in a virtual dead heat. Georgia's election laws require that a
candidate receive a majority of the vote, therefore a
runoff election was called. Hutson's subsequent endorsement of Coverdale resulted in Coverdale's contribution of the cost to inform Libertarians of that
endorsement. Coverdale won the runoff election.



CREATING AND SUSTAINING A LIBERTARIAN PRESENCE ON COLLEGE CAMPUSES

If we are not creating and sustaining a libertarian presence on campuses we are missing tens of thousands of potential libertarians.

Why campuses?

Why not someplace like a churches or senior communities? Campuses are filled with the most open minded, willing and idealistic people in a small condensed community. When students join, they remain active for another 40 or 60 years, not 5 or 10.

The libertarian movement experienced explosive growth in the 1970's when most of us were students.

Our Libertarian Party Campus Outreach Program is uniquely gentle, tolerant and non-alienating way of IDENTIFYING libertarians and potential libertarians on campus. The survey doesn't create libertarians, it IDENTIFIES them, thus increasing our odds of recruiting, and activism.

If we use the wrong approach, we are missing or driving away tens of thousands of potential libertarians.

- d. Field Organizer, Joseph Knight Tours campuses conducting surveys, does workshops, seminars and organizes clubs on campuses.
- e. Activities Coordinator, Marti Stoner Scheduling, Columnist, database management, general office work, and follow up of club activism.
- f. State Chairs Provide contact names. Inputs information on campuses that need organizing and request help from the Campus Program to organize. Elects, appoints, or volunteers the State College Coordinator and the Local Liaison/Coach.
- **g.** Local libertarians Advance work getting on campus, housing.
- **h. State College Coordinator** Keeping records of clubs in the state, scouting campuses for possible organizing, sending reports to Organizing Activities Coordinator, and State Chair.
- i. Local liaison/coach Keeping records of club he/she has volunteered to coach, sending records to State College Coordinator and Organizing Activities

CURRENT OUTREACH SURVEY TABLE

Accepts, acknowledges, Identifies. No arguments.

Gentle, 'soft sell', relaxed, non-threatening approach. Increases the number we talk to.

Allows people to come to the table and do the survey out of curiosity.

OLD STYLE LIBERTARIAN TABLE

Tries to overwhelm, overcome and defeat other people's view by aggressively arguing.

"Hard sell", confrontational approach.

Reduces the number of people we talk to.

Announces and shocks through signs and hard-core position papers, what we believe in, scaring people away.

COOPERATION AND PERSISTENCE of the key players in the Campus program makes this effort successful.

The key players, and their functions are;

- **a.** The members of the Libertarian Party helps with support.
- **b.** The National Headquarters staff backing our efforts and routes inquiries.
- c. Area Manager, Steve Dasbach Setting Policies, managing budget and other behind the scenes support.

Coordinator, be the motivating force behind the campus club, being in touch on a weekly basis, keeping the club ongoing, and growing.

j. Campus Club - Make sure that every student attending and graduating from that campus has heard and understands what the Libertarian Party is, and what we stand for through various methods and activities outlined in the College Libertarian Handbook.

Being the initiating impetus, Joseph Knight does the political survey on campuses. In a non-threatening non-confrontational manner, identifies libertarian students, connects them together, conducts a miniworkshop, provides essential materials and helps them to organize a campus club. Besides conducting the political survey on campus, Joseph Knight speaks to poly-sci classes, and holds a seminar "The Politics of Freedom" as another outreach to non-libertarians.

Depending on the requirements of the state party, a local liaison/coach is then selected, volunteered, appointed, or elected to nurture the new club. I cannot stress enough how vital this position is in sustaining the libertarian club on campus. His/her role is a very active, ongoing, interactive position with the campus club.

He/she is responsible for motivating the club in activities that will bring new members to the libertarian party. He/she will also keep the Organizing Activities Coordinator, State College Coordinator, and or State Chair advised of all changes and activities of the club.

The Campus club will be conducting activities on campus that will bring the libertarian message to all the students, as outlined in the College Libertarians Handbook.

These activities include meetings, helping with ballot status, holding seminars, putting up literature tables, having speakers, membership recruitment (club, state and national party), publicity and public relations, club newspaper, fundraising, demonstrations, debates, and most of all, purchase a survey table and continue doing the political survey on a regular basis.

They will elect new officers, and keep accurate records of membership and activities, which is essential to the continuity of the club.
