# Get Out and Vote on November 8!

or the first time in memory, the Libertarian Party of California is supporting more ballot initiatives than we

And while there are no candidates for statewide office this time, many of the initiatives will have a significant impact on the future of the state. It's very important that you take the time to vote on November 8 in our special election.

The only measure on which we decided not to take a position is Proposition 73, which would require parental notification before a minor can have an abortion. A two-thirds' vote of the Executive Committee is needed for the LPC to take a position on a ballot measure.

First, let's discuss the measures we are supporting.

Proposition 74 increases from two years to five years the waiting period for government school teachers to achieve tenure, and it makes it easier for school districts to fire teachers who are performing poorly. While this initiative is a very moderate move in the right direction, it is opposed by the teachers' unions, who hold our children hostage in a failed
