10 elected to office, records set

rom New Hampshire to Arizona, Libertarians were caught under the wheels of a GOP steamroller, but the results left Libertarians generally upbeat.

Along with a record-setting ballot access outcome, seven Libertarian Party candidates were elected to office and three were re-elected.

In addition, more than 2.3 million people across the country voted for Libertarian candidates. The LP's 15 U.S. Senate candidates received almost 650,000 votes, a total rivaling the record 1 million votes the 20 LP U.S. Senate candidates received in 1992. This year about 72 million people voted, while in 1992 about 104 million people voted.

Ballot access expert and LP "election historian" Richard Winger pointed out that in the 1992 election, while 100 percent of the nation's voters had an opportunity to vote for an LP candidate running for the most important office on the ballot, meaning president, only .3 percent did so. This year saw a significant increase, with about 65 percent of the voters having the opportunity to vote for an LP candidate at the top of the ticket, 1.7 percent did so.

Re-elected to office were three prominent Libertarian officeholders: Don Gorman, New Hampshire House of Representatives; Bonnie

Flickinger, Moreno Valley City Council, California; and Sandi Webb, Simi Vallev City Council, California.

Ballot access

LP position good for 50 in 1996

he Libertarian Party came out of the November elections in better shape than ever on the ballot access front.

"We made tremendous strides in the area of ballot access," said LP National Chair Steve Dasbach. "It's going to make a tremendous difference for 1996."

The Libertarian Party is assured ballot status for 1996 in "22 states, which is a record for us," said Richard Winger, nationally recognized ballot access expert and editor of Ballot Access News. "We've never even been on in 20 [states] before, right after any elections," he said. After the 1992 elections, the LP was on the ballot in 19 states, which was the previous best.

The Libertarian Party picked up ballot status in four states-Indiana, Wyoming, Massachusetts, and Michigan-and lost only one, Utah. Winger said Utah was not a problem, since gathering only 500 signatures will get the LP back on the positive side.

The results are important because "Indiana and Wyoming are terribly difficult, so those are the two most dramatic gains," explained Winger.

In South Dakota, the LP had never before pulled enough votes to stay on the ballot—2-1/2 percent is needed—and this year Nathan Barton received 4 percent in the race for governor. In 1992, the state did not apply the vote test against the LP, so technically ballot access there is not a

"Oh, Wyoming was so wonderful," said Winger. "We needed 3 percent for Congress and Dave Dawson got 6 percent. That was so great, because our candidates for governor and U.S. Senator didn't get the 3 percent. The one race that counted is the one race we got it in."

In Indiana, the LP needed 2 percent of the vote in the race for secretary of state, and Steve Dillon got 2.16 percent. "That was a squeaker," said Winger. "All the luck was good. Compare that to the Grassroots Party in Minnesota where any party needs 5 percent in a statewide race, and they got 4.9 percent in a race.'

It is also possible that the LP will be certified in Illinois, pending the outcome of a court hearing. The total needed for ballot status is 5 percent in any statewide race, which gives the party ballot status for statewide offices only. That, however, would include a presidential primary in

Voters across the nation embraced the Libertarian message of smaller government and lower taxes, but in most cases this year the beneficiary of the support was the Republican Party. But there was a lot of good news for the Libertarian Party.

Looking at the election from an ideological perspective, Libertarian Party National Chair Steve Dasbach said, "This election is being interpreted as a move in a Libertarian direction. If you look at what the Republicans say the election means, they are all talking about cutting back the size of government, the intrusiveness of government. I mean, I'm highly skeptical that the Republicans will actually do anything to cut back government, but clearly that's what they believe the people

Both Republican and Democratic pundits agree that the voters were sending a message to Washington, and it wasn't just that they want Republicans in office.

"I really don't think the issue was Republican vs. Democrat so much as the people vs. government," said

Victory for libertarianism

LP must be ready for exodus from old parties

Based on the news reports I've been reading, it would appear that the November elections were a resounding victory for libertarianism. Pundits and politicians, left and right, are interpreting the results as a resounding call by the voters for less government. Consider just a few examples:

- · Linda Dival, a Republican pollster, was talking about the meaning of the election and what voters were really saying on PBS's MacNeil-Lehrer News Hour. She expressed the view that voters were saying government should do less, not more. Then she added, "What we're seeing is a libertarian streak come into this election.'
- Larry J. Sabato, a scholar of campaigns and elections and professor of government at the University of Virginia, from an Associated Press article: "... the conservative wave now sweeping the country also has a libertarian edge to it. 'Don't tread on me, anti-government, leave the individual alone, to the extent possible."
- · Another Associated Press article: "(Tennessee Senator-elect) Frist declared the elections to be a strong public demand for libertarian principles. The Tennesseans, and most Americans, are fed up with government on their backs, in their pockets and on their farms,' Frist said in an interview conducted by U.S. News and World Report over the CompuServe net-
- · And finally, Republican National Committee Chairman Haley Barbour: "The voters have responded by rejecting Clinton's agenda and embracing Republican ideas of smaller government, not larger; lower taxes, not higher; and more individual freedom and personal responsibility, not more government power and government responsi-

So does that mean that we should close up shop and go become Republicans? Hardly. After all, we've seen Republicans talk like Libertarians before. Frankly, I'm highly skeptical that Republicans will actually do much to really cut the size, power, expense, and intrusiveness of government. Is Robert Dole really going to eliminate farm subsidies? Is Robert Dornan really going to stop trying to legislate private morality? Will the Republicans actually submit a balanced budget to Clinton, end the income tax, repeal the Brady Bill and the ban on semi-automatic weapons? And, is there any hope that they will realize that big government's attempts at Prohibition are the leading cause of the crime wave they say they are committed to ending?

Voters cast a resounding vote of disapproval for the Democrats. However, they are justifiably skeptical that the Republicans will do any better. According to postelection polls, more than 60 percent expect politics as usual from the GOP. What will happen if the Republicans fail to deliver

less government, or worse, try to implement the agenda of the intolerant right? Newt Gingrich seems to understand what's likely to happen: "Let me say one last thing. If this just degenerates after an historic election back into the usual baloney of politics in Washington and pettiness in Washington, then the American people I believe will move towards a third party in a massive way. I think they are fed up with this city, they are fed up with its games, they are fed up with petty partisanship."


We have to continue building a strong Libertarian Party to prepare for that exodus. We also have to keep the Republicans' feet to the fire to fulfill their mandate to cut government. After all, why are the Republicans interpreting this as a libertarian mandate, rather than a mandate for the agenda of the intolerant right? Consider the lengths they went to to keep us from competing

- George Pataki and the Republicans used every legal maneuver available to try to keep us off the ballot in New York. Fortunately, they failed.
- · Republicans tried everything they could think of to get Don Ernsberger out of the race against Rick Santorum in Pennsylvania. When that failed, Santorum was forced to take a more libertarian stance on
 - Republicans even pressed their friends

at the NRA into running attack ads against Jon Coon in Michigan, who had focused his campaign on restoring our right to keep and bear arms—all to help elect a Republican candidate who never even mentions the issue.

Thanks to the efforts of our candidates in this election, we begin the 1996 election cycle stronger than ever before. We gained ballot status in at least five states, with a sixth (Illinois) requiring a lawsuit. That puts us about a year ahead of where we were four years ago.

By redoubling our efforts, we can be ready when the voters realize that the Republicans haven't given them what they voted for. When they are ready to "move to a third party in a massive way," there will be a strong Libertarian Party ready to welcome them.





"Behind Your Back: What Do Other People Really Say About You And Your Libertarian Ideas?"

Candidates use OSS and PHC in campaigns

Libertarian candidates across the country used Operation Safe Streets and Project Healthy Choice as "powerful and effective" campaign tools in the 1994 election, according to the national LP office.

"We've had reports from all across the country about successful use of these projects," said National Director Perry Willis, who is coordinating the Operation Safe Streets (OSS) effort from the LP's Washington, DC, headquarters.

"From Don Ernsberger's nationally broadcast debate in Pennsylvania [for U.S. Senate | to Scott Kjar's state representative campaign in Nevada to the John Buttrick campaign for governor in Arizona, Libertarians are using OSS and PHC to promote Libertarian solutions," reported Willis.

Noting that the national office had sent information about PHC and OSS to all 662 LP candidates, Willis said, "These projects allowed our candidates to become 'instant experts' on the issues of crime and health care reform. Libertarian candidates were able to go before voters with solid, wellresearched, innovative solutions to these problems, while Republicans and Democrats continued to parrot the same old tired big-government rhetoric. I think these powerful and effective campaign tools contributed to increased vote totals—and increased credibility.

In other PHC and OSS news:

• Project Healthy Choice received its widest radio exposure last month when Dr. Nancy Lord appeared on the Doug Steffin radio show—syndicated on almost 100 stations across the U.S.—on Oct. 18.

Lord said she discussed the LP's proposals, as well as "what they [the Clinton Administration] might do next year that is more subtle and sinister."

• National Director Willis traveled to Maryland on Oct. 15 to give a "how-to" presentation to state LP activists entitled "How State Parties Can Use OSS to Grow."

"Ireceived an enthusiastic response from the audience," reported Willis. "I got a lot of questions, and a lot of favorable comments about OSS.

- · Willis also said that the national LP must "reexamine" its plans to run pro-Second Amendment advertisements on the syndicated Gene Burns program, following the surprise resignation of the popular Libertarian radio talk show host last month. Burns abruptly resigned from his flagship station, WOR in New York City, on Oct. 26, reportedly because of a dispute over program content.
- New Hampshire LP activist Doug Harrigan used OSS "ammunition" to score points on a televised debate on marijuana

legalization on Oct. 12. In a four-way panel discussion with a police detective, a representative from the state office of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention, and a law professor, Harrigan displayed a blow-up of the OSS chart which shows the close relation between drug and alcohol prohibition and the murder rate in the U.S.

"I ended strong by showing that chart. That piece of ammunition was crucial to making the point that prohibition increases crime-not decreases crime. It was very valuable," Harrigan said.



New Libertarian Party officeholders include Jim McClarin, New Hampshire House of Representatives; Steve Ziegler, Charles County Board of Education, Maryland; Dan Gallegos, Regional Transportation District Board, Colorado; Tom Jamerson, Chesterfield County Soil and Water Commission, Virginia; Daniel Walker and Dick Bjornseth, Ochlockonee Soil and Water Conservation District Board, Florida; and David Morris, Advisory Neighborhood Commission, Washington, DC.

In addition, Sidney Much was appointed to the Terra Linda Local School Board in Oregon the day before the election.

In New Hampshire, where prior to the election the Libertarian Party had four members in the state house, two incumbents—Finlay Rothhaus and Andy Borsa—were not re-elected. A third incumbent,

Calvin Warburton, did not seek re-election.

Newly-elected New Hampshire state house member Jim McClarin said that although the losses were a "setback, they were a readily explained setback." McClarin said that "all the voters wanted to do was pull that Republican lever, in many cases."

Libertarian House Leader Don Gorman, however, said "the Libertarians really have to start looking in the mirror. It's too easy to blame Clinton or the Republicans—that doesn't do any good. It think the Libertarians are going to take a real hard look at themselves and never mind this Republican sweep routine."

Gorman admitted that the Republican sweep played a part in re-electing only two Libertarians, but he said, "First of all, we have to say we can't blame anybody in the world but us, and that's a tough stand to take right there. Having reached that, then you are on your way."

Gorman also said "it was little early to tell" just what role the Libertarian Party delegation would play in the next state house session. Gorman plans to sit down with the house speaker and "negotiate our best position," he said.

He also noted that the Democratic Party also took a pretty big hit in this election in the state house, and that because of attrition, the power of the Republican leadership has also left somewhat of a vacuum.

"I'm still chomping at the bit," Gorman said. "I'm still rarin' to go. I'm still a Libertarian voice out there, and they are going to hear it—and they know it."

Along with keeping a Libertarian del-

egation, albeit a small one, in the New Hampshire state house, the other good news was that LP gubernatorial candidate Steve Winter received 4.5 percent of the vote, retaining the LP's "major party" status. This insures a presidential primary in 1996 in the state.

The fortunes of other LP candidates across the country offered mixed results.

In Arizona, LP candidate Scott Grainger received 7 percent of the vote, easily beating an LP record in U.S. Senate races. And the LP gained the attention of the older parties. "They [the LP] became very visible, and people are recognizing them," said Dodie Londen, head of the state Republican Party in a story in the *Arizona Returblic*

In California, Guy Wilson, candidate for U.S. House, competed in a two-way race against indicted incumbent Rep. Walter Tucker III. On a shoestring budget, Wilson was able to garner 22 percent of the vote, lower than had been hoped.

Also in California, Santee City Council candidate Steve Green received 4,754 votes, but lost a seat on the council by only 119 votes.

In Georgia, LP candidates set new state election records. Sharon Harris, candidate for agriculture commissioner, got more than 300,000 votes, 23 percent, in her two-way race against an entrenched incumbent. Her vote total was the highest any third-party candidate for state office has received in the 20th century in the state.

Also in Georgia, Larry Bolin received 32 percent of the vote in his two-way race for the state house. His total was also the highest for any third party state legislature candidate in the state in this century. Bolin accomplished this feat while running against a four-term Democratic incumbent so powerful he had never even been challenged before.

Bolin also won a precinct in Gwinnett County, a small part of which is in his district, the first time the state party has ever won a precinct, and also won an outright majority of the same county's votes.

"We've only been running statewide candidates in Georgia for six years, and our campaigns this year were conducted on shoestring budgets compared to the huge coffers of the two older parties," said LP state chair Montague Boyd. "Yet our campaigns not only set significant new state records, they were conducted with a new level of professionalism. We've laid the groundwork for future growth, and we're already eagerly looking forward to 1996."

In Michigan, Jon Coon, LP candidate for U.S. Senate, received 4.5 percent of the vote, after last-minute ads were run against the Coon campaign urging gun owners to vote for the Republican candidate and not to "waste" their vote on the Libertarian.

In Missouri, Bill Johnson received more than 88,000 votes, 5 percent, in his U.S. Senate campaign. This was a significant increase over the 3.1 percent the LP candidate for the U.S. Senate got in 1992.

All Missouri Libertarian Party candidates received more votes this year than in 1992.

"Here in the St. Louis area the LP candidates definitely had a Libertarian effect on the campaign rhetoric of the Democrats and Republicans," said Ken Bush, local LP campaign consultant. "With the presence of an LP candidate on the panel the other

two parties' candidates spoke of the sovereignty of the individual, the Founding Fathers' vision of self-reliance and less government, and the blessings of liberty."

Two closely watched state assembly races in Nevada ended with somewhat disappointing results—Paul Pratt received 27 percent of the vote, and Scott Kjar got 6 percent

In Ohio, Jim Berns received 17.4 percent of the vote in his race for state house. Two weeks before the election, Berns had been endorsed by *The Cincinnati Enquirer*. "The most knowledgeable candidate is Libertarian Jim Berns, the tax fighter who has run for a dozen offices just to drive home the message that less government is better government," the *Enquirer* wrote.

Don Ernsberger, LP candidate for U.S. Senate in Pennsylvania, received 1.7 percent of the vote. Ernsberger had been widely praised for his performance in a nationally-televised debate.

In Texas, John Hawley, LP candidate for associate justice of the State Supreme Court, received nearly 600,000 votes.

The results in other closely watched Libertarian Party races included: Mike Hurley for state house in Missouri, 23 percent; John Reda for state house in Delaware, 18 percent; Robert Heitner for Sussex County Freeholder in New Jersey, 19 percent; and Terry Savage for state assembly in California, 6.9 percent.

LP National Director Perry Willis said the election outcome "demonstrates the absolute essential nature of building up a strong membership base, a constituency for liberty, if we are going to be able to compete for votes."

Willis said he believes the LP needs to re-orient campaigns toward membership recruitment. Willis said if he were campaigning he would "give an introduction to libertarianism once a month, and I would set my campaign workers trying, in a very confined area, to identify potential libertarians."

Willis said he would then mail invitations to these potential Libertarians and invite them to come to the introduction, meet a Libertarian candidate, and have their questions answered.

"I would do that month after month after month," said Willis.

The 1996 elections are only 23 months away.

Democratic pollster Natalie Davis. "The voters are saying, 'Back to basics.'

"The vote wasn't so much a pro-Republican vote as it was a change-the-way-Congress-works vote," said Republican pollster Ed Goeas. "People decided it was so messed up that unless you correct the process the Congress was never going to be able to effectively deal with problems. I don't think they would worry about cleaning house again if they don't think Washington got the message."

Even Georgia Rep. Newt Gingrich, who will be the new House speaker in January, said, "If this just degenerates after an historic election back into the usual baloney of politics in Washington and pettiness in Washington, then the American people, I believe, will move towards a third party in a massive way."

Other political experts also recognized the libertarian streak in this year's cam-

"The referendum process was part of the voter rebellion that we saw at the polls," said Larry Sabato, a recognized expert on campaigns and professor of government at the University of Virginia.

While some issues were clearly more conservative in tone, term limits, criminal justice measures, and the immigration measure, there was also the defeat of the two anti-gay initiatives in Idaho and Oregon. "That says to me that the conservative wave now sweeping the country also has a libertarian edge to it. 'Don't tread on me, anti-government, leave the individual

alone, to the extent possible," he said.

The Republican Party's "much-ballyhooed 'Contract with America' promises that they will simultaneously cut taxes, increase military spending, and balance the budget," said LP founder David F. Nolan. "Pardon my reasonable doubt."

And Nolan is certainly not the only one to doubt that the Republicans will turn things around in Washington. A poll taken after the election by Republican pollster Frank Luntz showed that 42 percent of the respondents said neither party will "clean up the mess in Washington." And 73 percent agreed that "the federal government is too big and has too much power." Even two-thirds of those who voted for Clinton two years ago think that.

Nolan said that while some Republicans were sincere in their promises, "for most of them it was simply campaign rhetoric.'

Nolan doesn't think many of the promises will really be kept. "Oh sure, there will be a few token cuts in some of the more egregious social welfare programs," said Nolan. But he said he doesn't believe there will be any "real reduction in federal spending, and the national debt will continue to

And Nolan also warned that since the GOP will be unable to do much on the economic front, "the new GOP majority will turn its energies to enforcing rightwing social values. They may not be able to cut your taxes, but by God, they can crack down on abortionists, pornographers, drug dealers, etc.'

Nolan said there may be a few changes for the better-tax code revisions, a cut back of regulatory excesses, maybe even a move to term limis—but "the millennium has not yet arrived, either literally or figuratively."

Nolan noted that "perhaps the most important outcome of the 1994 'sea change' is that the political landscape has changed significantly. If they play their cards right, the Republicans can now legitimately claim to be the political center, leaving the Democrats stranded on the left/authoritarian side. Libertarians, Constitutional Conservatives, and other true advocates of shrinking the role of government can then come in on the Republicans' other flank, to hasten the inevitable realignment that will culminate in the Fourth American Revolution somewhere around the year 2004."

If this just degenerates after an historic election back into the usual baloney of politics in Washington and pettiness in Washington, then the American people, I believe, will move towards a third party in a massive way.

1996. The argument with the state is over how to calculate the percentage vote for trustee of the state university. Voters get to vote for three of the candidates, so the percentage should be figured by how many people cast ballots, not by the total number of votes cast. LP candidate Robin Miller received more than 200,000 votes, which should figure to about 8.5 percent.

According to Winger, "In 1948, the Illinois State Supreme Court ruled in favor of another third party in Progressive Party v. Flynn, and so the precedent is on our side. It should be a trump for us." According to Winger, similar challenges have happened in the past, but each time the challenge was taken to the federal court, when the argument should properly have been taken to the state court. "If there's any justice, we'll win," he said.

In Massachusetts, secretary of state candidate Peter C. Everett's 71,000 votes, giving him 4 percent of the total in that race, give the Libertarian Party major-party status there. Major-party status means that the LP has legal status equal to that of the Democratic and Republican parties. In 1996, the LP will be entitled to a primary election, and a reserved place on the ballot for its candidate for president.

"This is a great day for Massachusetts voters and the Libertarian Party," exclaimed Everett upon learning the results of his race. "Now the real work of party-building lies ahead. We need to start laying the groundwork for 1996 by building membership, recruiting candidates, and proving to the voters that we provide a serious and valuable alternative to the two incumbent

Previously, Libertarians had to collect 40,000 validated signatures to get a statewide candidate on the ballot. In 1990, the Fair Ballot Access law reduced the number to 10,000. The same law also allowed any statewide race to qualify a party for major party status, where before only the gubernatorial race would qualify.

In New York, although LP gubernatorial candidate Bob Schulz did not get the 50,000. votes needed to achieve ballot status for the LP, the lawsuit that Schulz filed prior to the election was successful in overturning certain petitioning requirements. According to Winger, this ruling will greatly reduce the effort needed to put the LP back on the ballot in 1996.

In New Hampshire, LP gubernatorial candidate Steve Winter got 4.4 percent of the vote, retaining major-party status for the LP there.

The ballot access victories this year put the LP in an excellent position for 1996. Concern over the changing of the date of the LP's 1996 presidential nominating convention, to July 1996, now focuses mainly on three states, Florida, West Virginia, and

LP Ballot Access Committee Chair Bill Redpath said plans already are being made to deal with those states. Redpath said the Libertarian Party is still on track for 50state ballot access for the 1996 elections.

High Court lets debate decision stand

On Nov. 7, 1994, the U.S. Supreme Court refused to hear the appeal of Arkansas Educational Television, which was fighting for the right to discriminate against third-party and independent candidates in debates that it sponsors. The case was *Arkansas Educational TV v. Forbes*, no. 94-490.

This means that in the 8th Circuit, public television is bound by that decision. The 8th Circuit includes Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Nebraska.

It also means that the *Forbes* decision will be influential in the rest of the nation, since it has the prestige of having resisted

reversal by the U.S. Supreme Court. However, there is a contrary 1990 precedent in the 11th Circuit, so the *Forbes* decision cannot prevail in Florida, Georgia, or Alabama, which are in the 11th Circuit.

Even before the U.S. Supreme Court action on Nov. 7, a Michigan state court followed the Forbes decision and ordered WKAR, a public television station, to invite all candidates to debate, not just the Democrat and Republican. The suit was brought by Jon Coon, Libertarian Party candidate for U.S. Senate.

Two other lawsuits are pending on the same issue in federal court. Both of them

were brought by Libertarian candidates. In Nevada, the suit was brought by Bob Days, LP candidate for U.S. Senate. In Texas, LP gubernatorial candidate Keary Ehlers filed suit in federal court against television station KERA.

In announcing the lawsuit, Ehlers said, "Reluctantly, I have been persuaded that it's necessary to defend my Constitutional rights, and the right of all Texans to a fair, impartial forum, in the courts."

Ehlers said that despite his campaign's "best efforts to convince KERA of their obligation to the public. . ., they have so far refused to do their moral, ethical, and legal

duty."

In Ballot Access News, editor Richard Winger noted that it was a good year for third-party and independent candidates getting in debates. Winger said those candidates were able to debate both major party opponents in at least 13 states in governor races, 10 states in U.S. Senate races, and five states in congressional-atlarge races.





Talking points

A look at government help, education, and more

Cliches and uninformed statements are easy to dismiss as senseless prescriptions from political outcasts and fringe ideologues. Libertarian advocates—be they candidates, state officers, speakers, pamphlet writers, or other spokespersons—may gain credibility for Libertarian ideas by presenting facts and quoting expert opinion that bolster LP positions. This column will provide the ammunition you can use to confound the skeptics and impress those searching for answers by citing mainstream publications and recognized opinion leaders (for and against individual liberty). Issue: Help for minority businesses

States and communities across the nation have set up programs to "set aside" a certain percentage of government contracts for minority companies (owned by females or members of selected ethnic backgrounds). These programs are touted as necessary for the formation and growth of the black and female business sectors. Not all minority observers agree:

"In fact, an argument can be made that set-asides actually are harmful to black commerce. Such programs have fostered minority dependency on government largess. They have been riddled with fraud. And, most important, they have failed to accomplish their primary goal, which is to increase the rate of black self-employment. Set-asides only interfere with this evolutionary process [to become a big firm]. As long as state and local governments reserve a certain portion of their contracts for minorities, the companies that depend on those contracts will never get to the point where they can make it in the mainstream economy. The mainstream is where the most successful black-owned companies are headed. Government set-aside programs lead in the opposite direction.

While set-asides tend to keep black businesses small and dependent, a federal program, Davis-Bacon, passed in 1931, neutralizes black labor competition by requiring "prevailing wages" be paid on all federal projects. Here's how Nona M. Brazier, an African-American co-owner of the Seattle-based Brazier Construction Co., describes it:

"Well-capitalized companies could afford union wages, but their unions usually kept blacks out. Black businesses—which were often less well capitalized—could not afford to pay those prohibitive rates on labor.

.. To seek Davis-Bacon contracts, minority firms must not only pay inflated wages and adopt inefficient work practices, but must expose themselves to huge compliance costs and threats of litigation and union harassment. Few minority-owned firms win Davis-Bacon contracts, and many others,

like mine, give up trying. . . Davis-Bacon remains a principal reason why blacks are unemployed at twice the rate of whites in the construction trade. Our nation as a whole also pays a steep price for Davis-Bacon, which accounts for 20 percent of the \$232 billion construction business nationally. A Congressional Budget Office study found the act costs taxpayers \$1 billion a year in unnecessary labor costs."

Issue: Government and "being helpful"

The Clinton Administration's AmeriCorps is off and running at a cost of \$1.5 billion during the next three years. This is a domestic Peace Corps, with 20,000 young volunteers, working in education, crime prevention, and other programs. John Walters, president of the New Citizenship Project, sees a problem with federalized charitable works:

"Overall, roughly 80 million Americans are active volunteers—that's almost onethird of the population... AmeriCorps likely will do more to disrupt than supplement these efforts. A federal program that reimburses "volunteers" can only discourage people from offering their time for free. And local philanthropic and community organizations may divert resources from genuine needs as they become supplicants for the federal subsidy of an AmeriCorps volunteers. The irony at the heart of AmeriCorps is that it tries to replicate a successful private-sector activity-voluntary community service—with another government initiative modeled on failed socialwelfare programs. The successes of existing community organizations could be expanded and duplicated if the harmful government intervention that already exists were reduced. Many private charitable efforts have been hobbled by federal regulations, judicial rulings that prevent them from offering low-cost social services, and professional-licensing, affirmative-action, and Occupational Safety and Health Administration requirements."

Even if one discounts the debilitating nature of government welfare programs, there is ample evidence that huge savings could be attained by reforming the delivery system. At one time, Milton Friedman advocated direct cash (negative income tax) subsidies to the poor in order to by-pass the waste that occurred in the bureaucracy. That waste is a prevalent as ever:

"America Works, a private company that finds jobs for people on welfare, recently opened an office in Indianapolis. Its biggest challenge? Getting welfare offices to send it enough potential clients. The company has jobs lined up and waiting for workers, but it has received an average of just 20 referrals a month from local caseworkers. Meanwhile, Indianapolis has 14,000 families on welfare. . . The existing welfare delivery system is a well-meaning but misguided monopoly. Break it up, encourage new and innovative providers, pay for the right results, and more people. . .will become producers of wealth instead of recipients of welfare."

Issue: Education

Every few years, a new educational "reform" sweeps through the government schools promising to reverse the decline into mediocrity and ignorance. The current buzzword is "outcomes-based education." Some parents object that OBE pushes standards and values to which their children should not be exposed. Others, however, see OBE as another abdication of the educators' responsibility to teach:

"Instead of clear, explicit goals, school districts are invited to produce long lists of vague generalities that their students are supposed to approximate. The whole idea of standards—even of grades—is anathema to the Great Thinkers out to reshape American education into an amorphous blob. Outcomes-based education may not be much of an improvement in educating the young—it may be a decided disimprovement—but the advantage for mediocre teachers and administrators is clear: they cannot be held clearly accountable if the standards themselves are muddy."

A significant test is now under way that, if it fails, will revive the argument that only more tax money can improve the education of children in America. If it succeeds, then the face of government education will be changed forever:

"On Monday (10/3/94), Hartford, CT, became the first city in the country to turn over the management of all of its public schools to a private company. Clearly the Hartford Board of Education recognized that public education must move beyond the old nostrums—such as the notion that pouring more money into education will produce better-educated students. What's needed is a new ethic that forces schools to really perform, not just keep on making the same mistakes...[A]s currently organized, schools are terribly inefficient: They continue to spend money in ways that do not consistently lead to high achievement. This lack of vision is seen in the perennial quest to lower pupil-teacher ratios. Between 1970 and 1990, American schools managed to reduce the average pupil-teacher ratio to 17.2 from 22.3. Yet extensive evidence has

demonstrated that there is no relationship between class size and student performance. Similarly, while the percentage of teachers with master's degrees rose from less than a quarter to more than half between 1961 and 1986, and while schools regularly pay teachers with master's degrees higher salaries, there is no evidence that these degrees produce better teaching."

Editor's note: The Hartford Board of Education voted 6-3 to give Education Alternatives, Inc. a five-year contract to run the city's 32 schools, with 25,000 pupils and a \$200 million annual budget. Minneapolis-based Education Alternatives already runs nine public schools in Baltimore and one in Miami. Education Alternatives promises to raise Hartford students' test scores without spending more money, plus invest \$20 million over five years in capital improvements.

Issue: The future

The "Digital Revolution," according to its leaders and practitioners, will almost certainly guarantee a more libertarian future. According to Louis Rossetto, editor and publisher of Wired magazine, new networks and software will change the face of American society by the year 2025. Caution: Like other revolutions before it, this one can be captured and diverted—most likely through the information revolution's erosion of privacy—to serve the aims of the governing classes.

"Public education is dead; long live learning... The era of central government is over. Signs of its imminent extinction are everywhere. The information economy, with daily transfers of trillions of dollars around the planet, has already stripped political leaders of control over their economies... The development of online political activism exposes today's politicians for what they are: an increasingly out of touch, and obsolete, elite... The quantity of violence will decrease since the power of governments—the main engines of slaughter in



A call to pens (and phones, faxes, etc.)

Washington has ousted Tom Foley; Massachusetts has no more rent control; and Oregonians can die with dignity. What an election! And, as if that weren't enough for one month. . .

The President has signed the Dietary Supplement Act! It's law now. This is the bill that prevents the FDA from regulating vitamin supplements out of existence. We have been working on its passage since October 1993. Congratulations!

We have a lot to look forward to with this new Congress. The congressional reform and spending cut proposals that we've watched languish in committee may now become law. We also can expect plenty of new proposals like Chris Cox's committee restructuring. He'd like to see obsolete committees, remnants of the liberal welfare state, abolished and replaced by useful committees like the Committee on Law Revision and Repeal. Ah! What bliss!

I don't mean to suggest that leviathan government has been conquered; that's hardly the case. But many of those who sponsored the best (and most stifled) legislation in the last Congress can now bring their bills out of committee and onto the floor. Once those bills reach a vote, the



many new members, who are most often our strongest allies, will work for passage.

Passage of House Resolution 140, which requires the federal government to include funding with its mandates, was a long shot a month ago but today it is a strong possibility.

Federal term limits are likely to see action soon, too. The new Congress, mindful of the many state term limits victories, is likely to be favorably disposed to HR 3835, the National Voice on Term Limits Act that creates a non-binding national referendum on the subject.

Now is the time to remind your legislators why they were elected and encourage them to keep their promises for smaller, less intrusive government. This is sure to be an interesting two years for government; be involved.

Initiative action

Along with voting for individual candidates, many Americans also spoke out on Nov. 8 on a variety of ballot initiatives.

Term limits continued to be a popular idea, with approval in Alaska, Idaho, Maine, Massachusetts, Nebraska, and Nevada—bringing to 21 the number of states that have accepted the idea. Utah voters rejected term limits this time.

Oregon voters passed a "Death with Dignity" proposal, which allows physicians to prescribe lethal medicine to dying patients.

Anti-gay initiatives in Idaho and Oregon were defeated, indicating the voters had a libertarian-leaning attitude rather than the conservative one many political pundits touted.

In Alaska, Measure 2 was passed adding victims' rights to the state constitution. "It's like it was lifted from part 1 of Operation Safe Streets," said Alaska LP Chair Len Karpinski. "We could not have drafted it better."

Also in Alaska, Measure 1 passed with 72 percent of the vote. It changed the state constitution's wording by adding the phrase "the individual right to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed by the state or a subdivision of the state," to the present section that "is a clone of the federal constitution's right to keep and bear sporting goods," said Karpinski. The additional phrase was added "just in case 20th century people aren't sure what the founders meant by militia," he said.





Issue: Crime and drug prohibition

Conservative intellectual William F. Buckley Jr. continues to use his nationally syndicated column to push for legalization of drugs. Lately, he cited a new report issued by the Association of the Bar of the City of New York titled, "A Wiser Course: Ending Drug Prohibition."

"As a practical matter, the committee advocates the repeal of all federal legislation dealing with drugs, leaving it to the states to write their own policies. . . The lawyers describe the impact of the drug laws on the judicial system. In some states it has become all but impossible to schedule a civil action, so clogged are the courts with drug-related cases. Twice as many Americans are in prison today as 10 years ago. The drug war has become a war against drug users, and the result is a serious and comprehensive contraction of civil liberties. . . Is it obvious that if drugs were legalized, the rate of drug consumption would dramatically rise? No-only 2 percent of Americans say they don't use drugs because they are illegal... Aren't we rightly concerned over the violence that would result from legalization?... What there is a great deal of is violent and anti-social behavior by men and women who in order to sustain their illegal habits are engaged every day in theft, mayhem, prostitution, and the communication of sexually transmitted diseases, including to children.




