JIM BURNS SEEKS LP PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION

James Libertarian Burns (no relation to disappearing candidate Gene Burns) is stumping California in quest of the Libertarian Party's 1988 Presidential nomination. (His middle name really is "Libertarian." He had it legally changed 12 years ago so that he would appear on the ballot as "Burns, James Libertarian.")

At a recent Region 66 LPC meeting Burns picked up contributions from most of those in attendance after describing the tactics he believes we should pursue: In 1984, the national media virtually ignored David Bergland and didn't even announce his vote totals on election night. We can change that in 1988, says Burns, if we can become a threat to win just one, or two, or three small states.

By putting our entire national advertising budget (a couple of million dollars, Burns estimates) into local TV advertising in Vermont, Nevada, and Alaska, we can outspend the Democrats and Republicans IN THOSE STATES. We'll be on TV more often than they will. As long as we don't say anything controversial in our ads, people will take us seriously and polls in those states will show us with a real chance to win.

The networks wouldn't dare take a chance of projecting a Democrat or Republican winner in Vermont, Nevada, or Alaska, so they'll have to come up with another color besides red and blue for their election night map. Then Libertarians will start to

get the national attention we deserve.

(Editor's comment: I was not among those contributing to the Burns for President campaign. If our candidates don't advertise our unpopular ideas every chance they get, but only advertise those ideas most people already agree with, or worse: don't advertise ideas at all, just "image", of course we'll get more votes, maybe even win some elections -- but then it will not be "we" who are winning the elections, but populists who will have taken over our Party and turned it into something no friend of liberty could support.)

Jim Burns will likely be seeking support for his candidacy at our state convention in Los Angeles, February 14 - 17. Come

Santa Clara LP's bulletin board.

Other candidates to have announced for LPC offices are: Bob Lehman of Los Angeles for Secretary, and Jerry Douglas of Canoga Park for Treasurer. Bob Lehman is currently the LPC's State Coordinator and previously served two terms as Secretary. Jerry Douglas is the LPC's current Treasurer, having previously served as Secretary.

HESS NAMED TO EDIT LP NEWS

Noted political author, speechwriter, lecturer, tax resister, and welder Karl Hess has been named editor of LP News, the newsletter of the national Libertarian Party, replacing Mike Holmes. Hess plans to make LP News a bulletin board for local Libertarian groups to publicize their activities and to exchange practical information while avoiding factional disputes.

Hess is planning for smaller but more frequent issues of LP News. The next issue will be 12 pages and should be out the second week of February. At the end of March or early April a 24-page "outreach" issue is planned, which will include articles on libertarian philosophy and issues. After that, bimonthly, usually 16-page issues of LP News are planned.

LIBERTARIAN CANDIDATES

As of January 21, 1986, sixty-five California Libertarians (that we're aware of) had taken out papers to run for office in 1986. Their names and the offices they are seeking are listed below.

District candidates (Congress, Assembly, State Senate) are circulating petitions which must be submitted by February 5th to waive part or all of the filing fee. The filing fee is \$722 for Congressional Candidates and \$337.32 for State Senate and Assembly Candidates.

EACH SIGNATURE a candidate submits will save his campaign several dollars in filing fees. For many, collecting enough signatures to waive the filing fee will make the difference whether they're able to run or not.

If you can help our candidates circulate their petitions, or even if you only have time to sign the petition yourself, give them a call. BE SURE TO DO IT BEFORE FEB. 5TH!

Since 1976, I have supported the Libertarian Party. In that time I have actively supported many candidates for various offices, but I have never been as enthusiastic about the potential of a candidate as I am about Norma Jean Almodovar for Lieutenant Governor.

California Libertarians have a rare opportunity at the upcoming LPC Convention to endorse a Lt. Governor candidate who will be truly complementary to the Gubernatorial candidate in that her primary thrust is in the Civil Rights/Victimless Crime

As Tonie Nathan, the only woman Libertarian vice-presi-As Tonie Nathan, the only woman Libertarian vice-presidential candidate ever to receive an Electoral College vote says:
"The Libertarian eagle has two wings. One is personal freedom. The other is economic freedom. Both wings are needed for the Libertarian eagle to fly." If one wing is larger than the other, the Libertarian eagle will not fly well. This campaign will have a strong personal freedom wing.

The Libertarian Party of California must attain 2% of the vote for at least one statewide candidate to retain ballot status. Californians have shown a propensity in the past for voting in a

Californians have shown a propensity in the past for voting in a maverick manner in three areas: 1) for women; 2) for the technically oriented offices; and 3) for the office of Lt. Governor.

We have a fine woman candidate in Carolyn Treynor for

State Controller, a technically oriented office.

The candidacy of Norma Jean Almodovar for Lt. Governor would provide the following advantages for the LPC:

(1) A woman candidate for the other maverick vote office.

This would double our chances for the 2% goal.

(2) Norma Jean's candidacy with its civil rights/victimless crime thrust would provide perfect balance with a Gubernatorial

candidate whose major emphasis was in the field of economics.

(3) Norma Jean has the current potential for more media access than any of the other potential statewide candidates. She has been a spokesperson on over 80 talk shows in the area of victimless crime with specific focus on prostitution.

(4) She has numerous sources of potential campaign contri-

We have the opportunity to boldly regain the Libertarian Party's lost support. But moreover, we have the opportunity to get Californians thinking about and acting for Freedom. Seldom does a candidate appear with the talent, intelligence and media value of Norma Jean. We should make the most of her abilities and the fortunes of current events.

In short, we must take advantage of the opportunity which Norma Jean's candidacy has to offer.

It is apparent to me that the political climate of today is not in accord with The Times editorial (Dec. 20), "The Blade at Our Necks."

The government sleigh ride for the last 50 years into socialistic militarism with bigger expenditures and deficits is repugnant to most of the non-governmental working people who pay most of the taxes. Thus, the Gramm-Rudman measure is a response to the strong demand for a balanced budget. Your editorial asks for more taxes now. The majority of the people want less taxes and smaller government. A re-evaluation of our priorities is in order.

By whose mandate is the United States the keeper of order for the world? For true defense, we must phase our troops out of Europe, and Korea and leave the Middle East factions to fight amongst themselves as they have been doing for the past 5,000 years. Defense costs paid by the countries requiring defense would result in tremendous savings to us, enabling us to concentrate on our own needs.

We can have true defense at less than half the dollars. An additional benefit would be that the countries paying for their home defense would be less able to subsidize their industries to compete unfairly with U.S. industries in the world markets.

How about eliminating the Department of Energy? Who needs it? Let our free enterprise oil companies develop the oil resources.

Save billions by abolishing the Department of Education. Local tax vouchers to parents placing their children in competitive private schools would completely revitalize our educational system. Ask any parent why he sends his child to a private school even though his tax dollars support public education.

Phase out and replace Social Security with private, actuarially sound programs. This would protect future generations from the burdensome financial loads they

will assuredly rebel against in the face of the increasing longevity of our population.

Stop the runaway increases of government pensions, over-generous vacations, sick leaves, and holidays. Cut congressional junkets, franking, nepotism and padded expense accounts. Privatize public services.

The ways to cut and save are many, and they will be accomplished as the electorate becomes informed. This should be a function of The Times, not to make a recommendation for an increase of taxes.




