What's Up Doctor Libertarian?

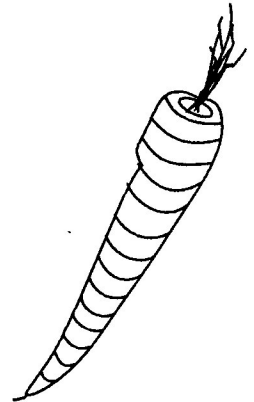
Convention-lite is the mode this spring for the annual Libertarian Party of Illinois state convention. As Illinois will host the national presidential nominating convention this coming Labor Day weekend, as to not overdose local libertarians on conventions, the organizers decided to make our state convention more compact than usual. However compact though it may be, a great deal is still happening.

The two announced candidates for the Libertarian nomination of President of the United States, Andre Marrou, and Dick Boddie, will address the convention. The annual *Nomos* Press party will take place on Saturday night, April 7. And the annual meeting is an important one. Delegates will be elected to the national convention. Also, a representative to the platform committee will be selected. And new officers will be elected.

Meals include a deluxe buffet dinner on Saturday night and a champagne brunch on Sunday morning. Before the annual meeting, we will have a round table discussion on the future role and goals of the LPI. This is an excellent time to provide input to the officers of the party so they know in what direction the membership wants to head.

The convention will take place at the Best Western Midway Motor Lodge, 1600 Oakton St., Elk Grove Village, IL, on April 6 & 7. Prices are very reasonable this year, only \$45 for a full package if paid before March 11; \$55 after March 11. Saturday night dinner, separately, is \$30/\$35. Sunday brunch by itself is \$20/\$25. Basic package (no meals) is \$15/\$25. A student basic package is \$5/\$10. Both meals will have vegetarian selections.

This is a great time to renew old friendships and develop new ones. If you have never been to a Libertarian convention before, we heartily urge that you come and enjoy the fun and fellowship. We really do have a lot of fun.

Some Lessons of the Persian Gulf War

As the Persian Gulf War draws down to an apparently quick conclusion, America is in a state of euphoric bliss. Our weapons technology has proven vastly superior to that of Iraq, which received most of its weaponry from the Soviet Union. Americans quite justly take pride in this accomplishment. The war was short, our casualty list as well. The demonized Saddam Hussein has been embarrassed, beaten, and humiliated. Many Iraqi soldiers have welcomed the opportunity to surrender to the coalition forces.

I must admit that I had thought the war would take much longer and cost many more human lives in the process than it did. Most "experts" also believed it would be a long ground war. And as of this time, there still is a possibility that the more fanatical of Hussein's army will be able to take to the Iraqi mountains and regroup to fight another day--probably in a more terrorist fashion.

But the total victory for the (mostly) American troops is beyond question. What is the main difference between Hussein's army and that of the Americans? It's not the numbers; in fact, the Iraqi Army had the slight advantage on that score. Control of the air was certainly on the side of the coalition, yet that didn't stop the Viet Cong fighting ferociously and effectively in the Viet Nam War even though the United States obliterated the country side with carpet bombs and napalm. The jungle terrain was different in Viet Nam than the desert of Saudi Arabia and Kuwait. However, the Iraqi soldiers were entrenched in fortified concrete bunkers with intricate tunnels that could withstand a nuclear attack.

The main difference between the two armies was one of morale, as Marine Brig. General Neal has said. A major portion of the Iraqi army (or what is left of it) was conscripted. Many men were summarily hauled off the street and put into uniform. They had no desire to fight a war; they were forced to do so.

Here in America we have learned from our mistakes. In Viet Nam, most American soldiers were conscripted, fighting half way around the world in a civil war for no good purpose. Despite a huge technological advantage, America lost the war. But now our soldiers are volunteers, professionals who want to be there, who take pride in what they do, with a singleness of purpose in what they are doing--a comradeship that only can develop from a system that lets people be free to choose whether or not military service is right for them. The victory of the Persian Gulf War is a victory for voluntarism (or freedom), the highest of American principles.

However, some of the other much vaunted gains from this war are illusory. The most often touted nonsense is that this victory is a triumph for democracy. By what stretch of the imagination? Can anybody name one Arab country involved in the coalition that can honestly be considered democratic? Certainly not the monarchies of Saudi Arabia and Kuwait. Assad's Syria? Six months ago Syria and Assad were America's arch enemy. Assad is still a thug--in the same class as Saddam Hussein. How about Khadafi's Lybia? Right... Egypt does have elections, but it can hardly be considered to possess real American democratic principles. Is the United States going to force feed American-style democracy to the entire Middle East--including socialistic Israel?

Despite the war's success (and for some Arabs--because of it), to the extent that America intervenes in the complex, historical problems of biblical proportions in the Middle East, we are going to increase resentment against the West thereby fostering even more fundamentalist dictatorships than already exist. More trade wars will result. And these developments could lead to an even greater war in the Middle East. We might not have the majority of Arab nations on our side in that one.

As Arab resentment increases, one can be sure that terrorism will also increase. And we can expect this terrorism to happen domestically this time. If the fanatics can't win a conventional war, they certainly will resort to even more terrorism. To combat this terrorism, we can fully expect the U.S. Government to react by further eroding basic individual rights. We will declare a "War on Terrorism." Just like the domestic "wars" before, the "War on Poverty" and the "War on Drugs," we will also lose the War on Terrorism and our Constitutional rights in the process.

One of the worst ramifications of this war, is what I term shallow machismo. Easy victories in war breed more war, more hate, more prejudice, more us-vs.-them attitude, more "might makes right." Diminished are the values of cooperation, friendly competition, reasoned discourse, grey shadings, and tolerance. Real machismo involves being strong enough to be tolerant of others, to listen as well as preach, to cooperate as well as compete, to back down from a fight of a lesser adversary--being confident enough of one's strength to not have to flaunt it.

The act of war by government half way across the globe is an act of legitimizing violence. It is not an act of self-defense. This process of legitimizing violence begets violence in the streets. Might makes right makes might makes right makes right makes right...

The most dismal ramification of the war is that the individual American citizen is one more quantum leap away from sovereignty. At the birth of our nation, the individual reigned supreme. He was sovereign. That is what the Declaration of Independence and the Articles of Confederation were all about, protecting individual sovereign rights. The United States Constitution changed the focus of sovereignty from the individual to the states. The Civil War

further eroded sovereignty, establishing the federal government as sovereign instead of the states. Now the "new world order" is coming. National Sovereignty is being replaced with international sovereignty. Each step in this process has been a quantum leap away from individual rights/individual sovereignty (and the other side of the coin, individual responsibility).

Does man live for himself or does he live for the state, the country, or some multi-national order? For me, the essence of life is self-directing. The antithesis of life is a slow, robotized, mind-numbing death that can only be anesthetized by silly sit-coms, meaningless sports events, and world-destroying wars that vitalizes only the base instincts of man. These are the soma of our day. The Roman circuses of our time.

Changes Proposed to the Bylaws and Convention Rules of the Libertarian Party of Illinois

(Keyed to the Bylaws as Amended through April 8, 1990)

Proposal 1: Fiscal Year

(Submitted by Scott Walton, Treasurer)

(1a) Amend Bylaw IV, Section 4, subsection (c)(6)(ii)--duties of the Treasurer--to read:

"Prepare a budget for a fiscal year of May 1 to April 30, to be approved by the State Central Committee and transmitted to the next Treasurer at the fiscal year's conclusion."

Proposal 2: Committee Chair Voting Privileges on SCC

(Submitted by Scott Walton, Treasurer)

Amendments to Bylaw IV:

(2a) Amend Section 1 to add "..., appointed standing committee chairs," after the words "of elected Party officers".

(2b) Add to Section 3 a new subsection (d): "Chairs of standing committees shall be appointed by a [fraction] vote of the State Central Committee." Rename (d) to (e).

(2c) Add to Section 4 a new subsection (a) (4): "Appoint the membership and chairs of such standing committees as may be considered appropriate." Rename 9a)(4)-(8) to (a)(5)-(9).

(2d) Amend Section 4, subsections (a)(4)-(5)--Newsletter Editor and Data Base Coordinator--to add "..., to be considered a standing committee chair," after each position title.

Proposal 3: SCC option to grant Votes to Newsletter/Data Base

(submitted by Sue Walton, Chair)

Amendments to Bylaw IV:

(3a) Amend Section 1 to add "..., the appointed Newsletter Editor and Data Base Coordinator (if granted voting privileges)," after the words "of elected Party officers".

(3b) Add to Section 4 a new subsection (a) (6): "Determine, at the first State Central Committee meeting after the State convention, whether the Newsletter editor, the Data base Coordinator, or both, shall be allowed voting privileges on the State Central Committee, these privileges to be in effect only until the close of the next State convention."

Rename (a) (6)-(8) to (a) (7)-(9).

Proposal 4: Rename the SCC

(Submitted by Ken Prazak, Newsletter Editor)

Change all references in the Bylaws and Convention Rules form "the State Central Committee" to "the State Organizing Committee".

National Committee Report

Steve Givot, our NatCom representative, reports that NatCom has approved changes made to the LP program. A Right to Keep and Bear Arms plank and a Savings and Loan Fiasco plank were accepted. NatCom approved the 1993 national convention site as Salt Lake City. NatCom also voted to schedule the 1996 presidential nominating convention in June to coincide with the time period the "major" parties hold their conventions. This means that the LPI will need to lobby the state legislature to change the ballot access laws in this state. As the law is now written, it would be virtually impossible to obtain the signatures needed and indeed even get the candidates' names on the petition soon enough.

Guns and Drugs

There is an election coming up in Chicago and the pre-election "hijinks" have shifted into high gear.

Mayor Daley is calling for new and tougher gun control laws. New controls on hand guns and semi-auto weapons appear to be in the offing for the "lucky" citizens of the windy city.

This is notable because New York City and Washington D. C. have tough "world-class" handgun-control laws while their murder rates are soaring through the roof. Proposals to ban semi automatic weapons make even less sense because all rifles (not just "assault" or semi auto ones) are used less often in murders than "blunt instruments." According to F.B.I. statistics, a citizen has less chance of being killed by an AR-15 (M-16) than a 2x4 or baseball bat!

However, poor Mayor Daley need not despair for there is a way to put a cap on Chicago's soaring murder rate; a libertarian solution to this problem exists. One need only grant individual citizens the right to own and control their bodies. In other words legalize all the drugs people are killing each other over. That's right---allow individuals to ingest without interference from the law.

In a "free" drug market, drug companies will settle their disputes in courts of law. Under the current system drug dealers settle their problems with gun battles on street corners and in dark alleys.

The Mayor need not worry about the message he would be sending to Chicago's youth. All that needs to be done is to educate children to the fact that there are many things that adults can do legally. Tobacco is a good example of this. Tobacco kills hundreds of times more people than cocaine does, and is many times more deadly than handguns.

Of course I don't expect "His Honor" to use this reasoned approach to his cities' crime problem. You see, it's an election year in Chicago.
