Sprik makes runoff in State Senate special election

Libertarian **Eric Sprik** was one of the three candidates in the 35th State Senate District special election last month to survive to compete in the runoff election set for May 14.

Eric, who is making his first run as a political candidate, will be seen on Jim Cooper's political interview show on Channel 50 at 9 p.m. on Monday, May 6, and Saturday, May 11 at 6 p.m. Watch for it and tell your friends to do the same. On the radio front, Eric has been a guest on libertarian **Mark Sugars'** interview show on KUCI. The interest was to great that Eric has been invited back for another stint.

Although the 35th District is heavily Republican, making GOP candidate John Lewis the prohibitive favorite, the LP can improve its standing with a good showing for Eric Sprik. So be sure to vote. Government is incredibly taxing

We all know taxes have been increasing, but few know just how bad things are getting. Consider these facts:

Suppose you paid all your taxes during the first part of the year and then were allowed to keep what you earned thereafter. That date is known as Tax Freedom Day. In 1930 it was February 13. In 1990 it was May 5. And if you don't think it can go higher, look at Sweden where the date is mid-September.

In 1948 the median family federal income tax was \$9. Yes, *nine dollars!* In 1990 the median family income tax was about \$3,000.

In 1948 the maximum social security tax was \$30. In 1990 the maximum tax was \$3,924. For the self-employed, the maximum was \$7,848.

The federal deficit is understated because of off-budget antics. The correct way to measure the annual deficit is to compare the national debt at the beginning of the year with the debt at the end of the year. The difference is the real annual deficit. In 1990 this figure was \$427.2 billion. This year for the first time we will have a one-half trillion dollar annual deficit!

The total national debt on March 22, 1991 was \$3.448 trillion. It will exceed \$4 trillion inside 14 months. And this figure greatly understates the real debt because it does not include the massive unfunded pension liabilities or future bad debts

such as the S&L debacle.

In 1950, the California budget was less than \$1 billion. This year it will be at least \$56 billion, and the spenders tell us that we "need" at least \$8 billion more. *Per capita*, California taxes have zoomed from \$92 in 1950 to \$1,934 in 1990, far exceeding inflation.

Inflation is an indirect tax imposed by government. The definition of inflation is higher prices resulting from the supply of money expanding more rapidly than the supply of goods and services. Government is the only legal producer of money. Government profits from inflation because it creates false paper profits which they can then tax (our country has the highest capital gains tax of any industrialized nation). For example, a \$10,000 asset which rises to \$20,000 because of 100 percent inflation is taxed upon sale as a capital gain, resulting in a \$3,500 (federal and California tax) windfall for government and a negative real return to the investor.

The inflation since 1948, caused by excessive government expansion of the money supply, results in us having to pay \$5.83 today to buy what a dollar would buy in 1948. Nevertheless, tax levies have increased at a rate several times the rate of inflation.

Meeting Time & Place


The Orange County Libertarian Party will meet Tuesday, April 16 at 149 Broadway in Costa Mesa. Doors open at 6:30 p.m.
