Fairoaks freedom fighter faces pro-tax Republican

For many years Libertarians have campaigned in thousands of races with no chance of winning. Rather, using the political campaign as a means of publicizing Libertarian issues, we know that someday people will have enough of the Republicrats to vote a Libertarian into office.

Libertarian Dr. David McCann entered the race for the 5th Assembly seat knowing he had no chance to win.

Just as we were all prepared to wait a few more years for a major political victory, fate has rocketed Dr. McCann into the spotlight.

A persistent strategy for winning

The unique opportunity that is presented for Dr. McCann in his 5th Assembly District race is exciting, and every Libertarian who can spare an extra dollar or some time to help out would be well advised to do so.

But the rest of us don't have to wait for such an especially favorable confluence of events to break into the political big time.

Anyone who is really interested in getting elected as an "alternative" candidate can follow the example of a socialist friend of mine, Max Nofziger.

When I met Max in the late 1970s he was an itinerant flower salesman, an underemployed English Lit scholar who blew into Austin, Texas on a wind from the Midwest. Max quickly made friends among the "progressive" crowd, people with a generally leftist, environmentalist orientation.

Max is a very likeable and articulate fellow. Despite his perpetual poverty he managed to parlay his personal charm into a grass-roots electoral campaign for the Austin city council. In his first race, which if memory serves was in 1977, Max placed fourth in a four-way race.

He ran for city council again in 1979 and for Mayor in 1981, each time earning progressively larger vote percentages.

In 1983 Max ran for a city council seat, and polled a large enough vote to cause a runoff election. At this time the major news media came to regard him as a serious political force, for he had gradually developed a political following among various envi-

ronmentalist, slow-growth, and "alternative lifestyle" political organizations.

In Max's 1985 council race he made it *into* the runoff election, and defeated the establishment candidate. Max won re-election in 1989.

Winning a city council seat in Austin is comparable to winning a council seat in Anaheim, Santa Ana, or Huntington Beach, or a County Supervisor seat, or a State Assembly or Senate seat, or possibly even a U.S. Congressional seat. It's high time a Libertarian stood up and got seated.

The lesson of Max Nofziger's success is that persistence pays, and coalition building gets results. In Orange County we can tap into a large local reservoir of anti-tax resentment, and appeal to our neighbors' sense of individualism, which seems better developed here (outside of Irvine, anyway) than most places.

A few of us have a real knack for political campaigning, and working with outside groups that share some of our interests. Those Libertarians should give some thought to a longer-term strategy of running to win, if not this election, then the next, or the one after that, or the second one after.

Get yourself known, to the media and the groups you hope to bring over. Get voters accustomed to seeing your name on the ballot. The more they see you, the more "real" you become to them. Use the time to sharpen your skills and broaden your knowledge, and share that knowledge with fresher candidates.

And then soon some of us can join Dr. McCann in the State Assembly.

Meeting Time & Place


