21 SCHOLARS ENDORSE TUCCILLE FOR GOVERNOR

Twenty-one distinguished professors and writers have announced their support for Jerry Tuccille's gubernatorial bid.

Laura Wertheimer, Tuccille's campaign manager, released the list to the press today, noting that the scholars backing Tuccille shared his commitment to individual rights, free enterprise and limited government.

"It's not an everyday occurrence," said Ms. Wertheimer, "that academicians from such institutions as Harvard, Stanford, Berkeley and the University of Chicago come out publicly in support of a third-party candidate for governor of New York.

"The term 'intellectual' has for too long been associated only with left-wing ideologues. It's reassuring to witness a renaissance of libertarian scholars in our universities."
