It's Yes on Proposition O

Libertarian Measure Wins by 54 Percent!

SAN FRANCISCO: The one bright light in an otherwise abysmal Primary night was the stunning victory of Proposition O, the "Clean Needle Initiative," which requires the city council and county supervisors to make a formal call upon the state legislature to remove all civil and criminal penalties on the manufacture and distribution of hypodermic syringes. It is currently a misdemeanor in California to possess a hypodermic syringe without a prescription, except for certain people such as diabetics. Libertarian Richard Winger, editor of *Ballot Access News*, told Jim Peron that it's the first time in any community that a Libertarian-sponsored inititative has won.

The measure is short and simple: "We, the people of the City and County of San Francisco, CA, call upon the California State Legislature to eliminate all sanctions; criminal, regulatory or civil, on the manufacture, use, sale or other distribution of hypodermic syringes. We do this to reduce the spread of AIDS and other diseases."

The simplicity is deceptive. The city and county now must formally ask the legislature to permit a *free market in needles*—a fact not lost on a certain special interest groups who not only refused to endorse Prop. O, but spoke out bitterly in opposition. The issues were thus clearly defined.

"I'm even more against Prop. O [than against needle exchange] because it just calls for legalizing needles without any controls," Health Commissioner Naomi Gray told the press. "It's saying people want to be able to buy needles at their local grocery, not just in a supervised needle exchange."

In another account the S.F. Chronicle quoted Gray: "Prop. O goes even further than needle exchange. I think we should be fighting for more drug treatment slots, not for access to needles." A free market is clearly not on her agenda.

But it is on the agenda of Libertarians, and several dedicated San Francisco LP activists set to work. George Meyer, Jim Peron, John Whisman and a group of grassroots supporters gathered the necessary signatures to put the initiative on the ballot. This was no easy task, as the County put a number of hurdles in their way and said, JUMP! The Libertarians and their new allies jumped! (see back issues of *CLNews*).

To everyone's surprise they got the signatures, but then the real opposition started, with groups like the San Francisco AIDS Foundation and Projection Point (a volunteer group which distributes needles, albeit illegally) lobbing pot shots.

Representative of these two groups met with the Libertarians and tried to persuade them to take it off the ballot. Chair John Whisman said, "No one owns this issue. This isn't about turf or politics. It's about saving lives."

The *Chronicle* asked Jim Peron about the concern among establishment groups that "Libertarians haven't been willing to work with those in the frontlines in the fight against AIDS."

"That's not true," said Jim. "Everyone that took our petition to the streets, who collected the signatures, and who signed

State Convention Cancelled

Some of you may have heard that an LPC state nominating convention was to be held July 14 in Los Angeles. Unfortunately, due to certain time constraints the convention had to be cancelled. The date June 23, given in last month's *CLNews*, was tentative and later changed to July 14.

The idea was to hold the statewide nominating convention in Los Angeles, the same day and at the same location as the L.A. County multi-regional Convention, but early in the day, from 10-11 a.m. Other regions could participate by telephone hook-up if they arranged to have their conventions at that time or sent delegates.

Although there will be no state convention, counties (including the seven L.A. regions) will be having conventions in order to nominate candidates for Congress, assembly and state senate. The day to hold a convention is up to the county, but it must be before August 5 and all members in a county/region must be receive at least 30 days advance notification.

The conventions take advantage of the recent bylaws change to allow nomination of candidates for partisan office by convention. However, it is still up to the courts whether or not to allow our nominees on the ballot.

Free Kerry Wiley

A Sacramento man, Kerry Wiley, 37, is facing the death penalty in Maylasia for supposedly trafficking and possession of about a pound of marijuana. His attorneys have stated that Wiley uses marijuana for the pain he suffers due to a car accident. Under Malaysian law this is no defense, nor need the government prove that any selling or sales took place. Possession is possession, and the punishment is death.

LPC gubernatorial candidate Dennis Thompson has written a letter to the Malaysian ambassador to the United States seeking Wiley's release from prison. The Thompson campaign is also launching a boycott of Malaysian products and travel to that country if the government persists in its intention to execute Wiley. The LPC Executive Committee met in San Luis Obispo, May 20-21.

- Cullene Lang is Secretary: One problem required almost immediate solution, that of who would be secretary. Cullene Lang had been asked to take on that task, and agreed to do it; she was promptly elected.
- Database Contract: The contract to handle database responsibilities went to Hugh and Thea McLean, who have a company for that purpose called WITHEASE. They will be processing the dues, memberships and mailing lists. Their address is in the Directory and on the membership form.
- Anti-Malathion Petition Endorsed: An initiative to outlaw broadcast spraying of pesticides by the California Department of Agriculture is being circulated by activists statewide. The LPC's endorsement was sought by its author Oscar Singer, and a resolution of support by the ExCom was drafted by Jordan Zimmerman and Sarah Foster. It passed overwhelmingly, placing us firmly behind this initiative.

Not everyone in the establishment opposed it. A major endorsement came from the Democratic Party Central Committee, followed ones from smaller Democratic organizations. "We're getting endorsements now from groups I never knew existed," Jim told CLNews a few days before the Primary. "The Socialist Democratic Club has just endorsed Prop. O."

It was anyone's guess how the newspapers would go: the Bay Guardian, a left-wing gay newspaper, said no; the S.F. Examiner said no—but the Chronicle, perhaps persuaded by libertarian arguments finally gave its support.

On Tuesday, June 5, when the votes were counted it was 66,578 for; 57,586 against. "That's 54 percent," Jim points out, "We did better than Diane Feinstein. She got only 52 percent here in San Francisco!"

Those in the frontlines had given their approval.

Suppose they Gave a War and Nobody Came

Every so often a book comes along that is so outrageous, so patently evil in its outlook that you want to throw it away; but you don't; you read it carefully, fascinated yet repelled by the mentality of whoever put it together. *Report from Iron Mountain* is such a book. You can't help but wonder if the authors abandoned their humanity all together.

The 15 men who put the report together in 1966 had been invited by an unknown person in the Kennedy administration (probably Robert McNamara), to explore what would happen if, perish the thought, peace were finally to come to a war-weary world, and what to do about such a contingency.

We don't know who the men were that formed this "Special Study Group," as the commission was called, just that they came from largely acadaemia, particularly the fields of law, political theory, sociology, etc. We only know about them at all because one of the members decided the report really should be published; not because he disavowed it, but because he disagreed with his colleagues on the desirability of keeping it secret. He thought people should know about the plans being laid for them.

In 1966 it looked as though there could be peace at some point; disarmament would at some point be inevitable, if only because the alternative would wipe out the human race. Yet the commission was not anxious that what they call "the war system" be abandoned; the war system fulfills functions that are vital to civilized life, they decided. They admitted this is a different approach from earlier studies that assumed the desirabilty of peace, and talked about the greatest "good" for the greatest number, and the "dignity" of the individual. (The quotes are in the original). No, these commissioners approached their subject not with sentamentality, but with what they considered objectivity. They aschewed all moral judgments, except one: i.e., that survival and "the stability of society is the one bedrock value that cannot be avoided." Even if at some point the military functions are removed, substitutions must be in place-non-military institutions which would fulfill the same requirements.

The functions are **economic** ("war and only war solves the problem of inventory." It is necessary precisely *because* it is wasteful, with war production being exercised "entirely outside the framework of the economy of supply and demand"); **ecological** (as a tool for eugenics, war wipes out surplus population); **political** ("In modern democratic societies, the war system has seved as the last great safeguard against the

elimination of necessary social classes"); sociological (war serves as a controlling device over "unsettling elements" in a society); cultural and scientific; and several miscellaneous.

To return to the original question, what to do if peace breaks out. The answer is, to have a non-military war system in place. To have credible substitutes, surrogates they're called: real war-like enemies to stimulate the necessary usagainst-them reaction. So these pundits write soothingly of the necessity of instituting a new version of slavery: "Slavery, in a technologically modern and conceptually euhemerized form, may prove a more efficient and flexible institution in this area"—as a control function. You got it—they recommend a national service. There will be a need to create a ougaboo of some kind "generalized external menace" is how they put it: a threat from outer space, yeah, that might work. They actually put that idea on the table. Maybe the environment! That might work.

They recommended that the president create a top-secret agency by executive order, one answerable only to him, governed only by its own rules of procedure, with the "unlimited right to withhold information on its activities."
