

ELECTION '78 -LIBERTARIAN VICTORY

The LPN Election '78 can only be described as a stunning victory. The biggest win was obtaining statewide ballot status for 1980 by getting enough votes. Harry Joe Mangrum was proved correct in his selection of Florence Fields for Lieutenant Governor since she garnered 10,624 votes, more than enough for ballot status, and also enough to split the Lieutenant Governor's race wide open. Hope Weed (10,212) in the Clark County Recorder's race and Miki McCarty (11,053) in the Clark County Public Administrator's race surprised all Libertarians as well as themselves with their outstanding vote getting capacity which gave us triple insurance to statewide Libertarian ballot status in 1980. Jim Burns, whose persistence and personal as well as financial sacrifice put the Libertarians on the ballot in '76 and '78, heaved a sigh of relief as the vote totals grew passed the 9,327 needed for ballot status. Burns also did very well in his AD18 race by obtaining 14.6 per cent of the vote and defeating the Republican opponent, a Libertarian first in Nevada.

Alaska became the bright north star in election '78 by electing the first Libertarian to a State legislature - Dick Dick Randolph.

Libertarian Ed Clark, running in California as an Independent, won 5.5 per cent of the vote for Governor and scored 372,805 votes.

Hawaii, like Nevada, also gained permanent ballot status for 1980.

So the future looks bright for the Libertarian Party, especially in the West.

Every candidate did an outstanding job in promoting Libertarian ideas. Take a look at the list and whenever you meet one give them the encouragement that they'll need to repeat their efforts in 1980.

Because the IAP failed to garner sufficient votes in any of their races to win ballot status for 1980, most of the leadership of the IAP has been considering re-registration with the larger Nevada Parties.

Our recent gains, both in Nevada and nationally, are emphasized to encourage these staunch fighters for liberty to join with us as Libertarians and continue our forward progress.

Social Security?

Dear Editor:

For 40 years millions of Americans have been paying social security taxes to the federal government in the belief that the government was putting their money into numbered accounts in trust funds. They were led to believe that their money would accumulate in their accounts until they retired, when they could begin receiving the money in the form of monthly retirement checks. But the truth about social security and the beliefs that many Americans have about it are two entirely different things.

The first truth about social security is that there are not and never have been any trust funds. All the taxes collected from American workers (their "contributions") have been used to buy bonds of the United States government. There is no gold in the trust funds. There isn't even any paper money. All that is there are notes from the U.S. Treasury saying I.O.U. Your social security taxes have already been spent by the federal government. Your taxes were spent as fast as they were paid. Worse yet, in order to pay off the I.O.U.'s the Treasury has given the Social Security Administration, the federal government would have to raise your taxes. In short, not only has the average worker paid an exorbitant price for social security "protection" already, but in order to collect, he will have to pay again. He will be taxed twice for "benefits" he may never live to collect

If there are no trust funds, then there can be no accounts containing the taxes you have paid plus the interest they have earned. In 1940 the U.S. Supreme Court declared: "The proceeds of both the employee and employer taxes are to be paid into the Treasury like other internal revenue generally, and are not earmarked in any way."

Since there are no trust funds and no numbered accounts, there is no security in social security. What a worker receives when he retires—even the age at which he may retire—is at the whim of Congress. Recently there has been discussion in Congress about raising the retirement age from 65 to 68 or 70. Congress may do that. If a private insurance company tried it, its officers would be slapped in prison.

Congress has, in fact, denied benefits to thousands of workers. When social security began in 1935, Congress decided that any worker who had paid social security taxes and who had reached 65 but

did not qualify for any benefits would simply have his taxes (or the half that he paid) returned to him. If a qualified worker died before he reached 65, his estate would receive his taxes. But in 1939 the Congress changed its mind and reneged on the promised refunds. The Congress has the power under the law to pay whatever benefits it wishes or none at all. It also has the power to print paper money and "pay off" all the promises it has made. Of course, paying in paper money will destroy the value of whatever "benefits" may have been promised. No one has a contract with the Social Security Administration guaranteeing his benefits. All he can do is trust the government. There is no security in social security.

Just as the government likes to call your social security taxes "contributions," it likes to call the money it spends "benefits." Yet no benefits from social security are guaranteed. A young or middle-aged worker could purchase an insurance policy from a reputable, private company that would pay benefits far surpassing those paid by social security for less than half of the amount he pays in social security taxes.

Because social security has no trust funds, today's taxes pay today's social security recipients. Premiums paid to a private insurance company would be invested and used to create new jobs and new wealth.

Not only can Congress decrease or eliminate social security "benefits" any time it wishes, it can also increase the costs any time it wishes. Last Dec. 15. Congress voted to triple the maximum social security taxes over the next 10 years. The maximum tax paid by an employee in 1977 was \$1,930 (half is paid through payroll deductions; half through lower wages). By 1987 the maximum tax will be \$6,092 per year, more than triple the tax paid in 1977. Unless social security is seen for what it is, the American worker will continue to pay ever-increasing and crushing taxes to keep impractical wealth redistribution scheme going. But until the problem of social security is exposed and corrected, millions of workers will pour billions of dollars into a program that guarantees social, political and economic insecurity, not security. A program is needed that has a sound investment fund principal included.
