Flanzer Leads New York Libertarians

■ Pulls almost 15% in State Senate race

Long-time Libertarian activist Robert Flanzer pulled almost 15% of the vote in his race for State Senate in the 25th district. The 25th district covers part of Kings and part of New York counties. Flanzer was running on the Republican, Conservative and Freedom lines and received 7,803 votes; his opponent, Martin Connor was on the Democratic and Liberal lines and received 46,070 votes.

Flanzer was one of six Libertarians who ran for public office in New York State last November, though none of them ran on the Libertarian line. Four candidates ran for State Senate, one for State Assembly and one for City Court Judge. Each chose to run as a candidate of a party that already has ballot access.

Soleil gets 7%

Andre Soleil received over 7% of the vote in his race for State Senate in the 18th district. The 18th district covers part of Kings. Soleil was on the Republican, Independence, Liberal and Freedom lines. He received a

total of 4,347 votes. His opponent, incumbent Velmanette Montgomery was on the Democratic line and recived 56,313 votes.

Greene 2nd in 3-way

In the 20th State Senate district, David Greene pulled over 6% of the vote and finished second in a 3-way race. Greene candidate on was Republican and Freedom lines received and 3,060 votes. Democrat Marty Markowitz won with 43,571 votes and Conservative Clarence John received 665 votes. The 20th district covers part of Kings.

David Harnett pulled less than 1% of the vote in a 4-way race for State Senate in the 41st district. Harnett ran on the Freedom line and received 735 votes. Stephen Saland who was on the Republican and lines Conservative received 70,119 votes; Democrat Joel Tyner received 30,043 votes; Independence candidate Fairlene Rabenda received 3,725 votes.

Thomas Hamilton received about 1.5% in his 4-way race for (continued on page 2, column 3)

with 179,000 votes. John Hagelin of the Natural Law Party finished with 110,000 votes. Phillips was on the ballot in 40 states, Hagelin in 43.

In New York, Browne finished with a total of 12,220 votes out of over 6 million cast. His highest percentage in any New York county was in Tompkins where he polled 162 votes out of 37,491 for .4%. His worst percentage was in the Bronx where he polled 242 votes out of 301,383 for .08%.

Web Page Growing

The number of individuals accessing the LPNY web page took a huge leap in July and continues to grow. In July, 277 people accessed the page; in August, 366; in September, 278; and in October, 385. By contrast, in June only 75 people accessed the page and in May only 66.

The huge increase probably caused by two things. Libertarian National The Convention was televised on C-SPAN in early July and may have generated a lot of interest. Also, in July, the LPNY web page was added to YAHOO. YAHOO is an Internet search mechanism that allows users to type in key words to find information they are looking for.

In October, AOL added a link to the LPNY page which should generate additional accesses. AOL is the nation's largest online service.

The web page was first set up in the middle of last December. That first half month there were 30 accesses. In January, the first full month, there were 70; in February, 110; in March, 82; and in April, 72.

LPNY also has an e-mail list where members can post messages of interest to the others. There are now 40 subscribers to the list. Mail can be sent to subscribers at:
