# Streamlined Bylaws Pass at Annual Meeting

With only one dissenting vote, Libertarians voted to adopt a new set of Bylaws to replace the old Bylaws and Constitution of the Libertarian Party of Illinois at the Annual Meeting held on Sunday, April 8 at the Best Western Midway Motor Inn in Elk Grove Village. Bylaw committee members Helen Heyden, Mike Woloshin, and Ken Prazak were successful in rectifying duplicating, conflicting, and cumbersome bylaws by replacing the old set with a new one and the membership apparently agreed.

The most controversial and major change in the Bylaws has to do with local clubs. The new Bylaws encourage the formation of local Libertarian clubs by requiring that a club just consist of five members or more and petition the State Central Committee for designation as a local libertarian club. The new Bylaws eliminate geographic designations. Each local club receives one vote on the SCC.

Another aspect of the new Bỳlaws is in the trend towards more consensus voting. Bylaw committee members felt that consensus voting is more in keeping with libertarian principles.

Much of the old bureaucratese (obviously not in keeping with a libertarian spirit) and (hopefully) all of the conflicts were eliminated from the Bylaws. The length of the Bylaws was cut down by approximately one-third.

Committee Chair Steve Nelson (who conducted very objective, open, and efficient bylaw meetings) supported retention of the old Bylaws. Committee member Harvey Gould drafted his own set of bylaws which contained no specific organizational rules to speak of, but probably reflected what most libertarians would like in their fantasy, if not in their reality. The Convention chose the middle-ground.

# Riding the Wake of a Libertarian Wave

A reasonable, optimistic, and purposeful tone permeated our 1990 State Convention occurring on the weekend of April 6. The Tax Accountability Amendment is on the verge of a successful petition campaign. *Nomos* has reorganized with renewed vigor. *Prairie Fire*, a libertarian outreach newspaper, has published its premier issue. The Heartland Institute has recently issued an excellent agenda in book form to make 1990s Illinois' decade, *Coming Out of the Ice*. Two downstate clubs, the Illinois Valley Libertarian Association and the Central Libertarians of Illinois are becoming extremely active. Libertarian students from two universities attended the convention are begging for some help from activists to become active. The consensus of opinion believes that the time is ripe and the tide is turning towards the libertarian direction in Illinois for the coming years.

Bob Waldrop, Coordinator of the Council of State Parties, and former Chair of the State of Utah, began the Saturday morning session with an excellent workshop on Building Your Own Libertarian Neighborhood. Waldrop bases his plan, (which helped to elect the first libertarian town in the United States, Big Water,

Utah), on the bible of political activist organization, Saul Aulinsky's, Rules for Radicals. An activist affects change by immersing himself in the community, getting to know everyone in the community, by aligning with single issues, canvassing the neighborhood to account for support, building up a data base, and making sure supporters vote on election day. Waldrop points out that this is what the Republican Party has done very successfully in the past twenty years. They have a forty year plan to become America's majority party and are right on schedule up to this point. Waldrop demonstrates that the Libertarians must do the same.

Ross Korves, our resident public policy expert, described in the Saturday afternoon session, that the conditions are ripe in Illinois for the next four years for the Libertarians to make real progress in affecting change. We must make hay when the sun shines. Libertarians should develop coalitions with single issue people and develop leaders of these groups while broadening their horizons in a libertarian direction. Taxes, education, healthcare, and waste treatment will be the big issues in the coming years in Illinois. We must be prepared to have viable answers to these problems and be there when the time is ripe to provide these solutions. Korves surmises that Hartigan and the Democrats will win the next gubernatorial election and problems will continue to get worse as both Republicans and Democrats are squeezed between an anti-tax sentiment rock and a pro-service hard place. The two major parties will have had a decade and a half to solve problems and will have failed. Then in 1994, the Libertarians will have the opportunity to act.

For Sunday morning brunch, libertarian WLS talk-show host, Stacy Taylor reiterated the optimistic theme that the time is ripe for libertarian change. He perceives a majority of callers to talk shows as libertarians whether they realize it or not. Libertarians need to latch onto the populist libertarian issues such as taxes, education, incumbency and government arrogance. The talk show is a great forum to promote this type of coalescing. Stacy reports that his new radicalism is already bearing some fruit.
